Following introductions, an overview of the agenda, meeting objectives, and the purpose of the Title I COP were shared.1.The Elementary and Secondary Education Act, as reauthorized by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015, requires that each state education agency (SEA) that receives funds under Title I has a committee to advise the State in carrying out its responsibilities under Title I – the Committee of Practitioners.2.The ESEA requires representation from individuals who bring a unique perspective and expertise in the areas of Title I and serving children in high poverty, including a local school board member.3.The duties of the Committee of Practitioners include: a) reviewing and providing feedback on a proposed or final State rule or regulation impacting Title I prior to publication, b) receiving information on other programs and activities that may have Title I implications, and c) providing input on Title I specific matters such

3. Shanna provided information about the TSI 360 Advisory Group. This group will serve as a Community of Practice for the purpose of sharing information to assist LSSs to make improvements in their Title I TSI Schools. COP members were invited to participate.
<ol> <li>Tricia reported that Maryland applied for and was granted an <u>Accountability Waiver</u>. This Waiver from the USDE for the 2020-2021 school year means that MD is</li> </ol>
waived from the following:
<ul> <li>a) measuring progress toward long-term goals and measurements of interim progress;</li> <li>b) meaningfully differentiating, on an annual basis, all public schools;</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>c) identifying schools for comprehensive, targeted, and additional targeted support and improvement based on data from the 2020- 2021 school year; and</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>certain reporting requirements related to accountability.</li> </ul>
e) Maryland assured that accountability system
reporting will resume in the fall of 2022 using
data collected from the 2021-2022 school year.
However, further details specific to CSI and TSI
identification and exiting are still pending from
MSDE's Accountability office.
5. Jodi led a discussion around staffing shortages and the
use of federally funded positions. She acknowledged
