The NDP for 2017 is Mr. Michael Browne, who is principal of Pocomoke Elementary School in Worcester County.

MAESP's Assistant Principal of the Year for 2017, Mrs. Lorie Barnes, was the Assistant Principal, last year, at Monarch Global Academy a public charter school in Anne Arundel County. She was recognized in March at the MAESP Annual Conference. Mrs. Barnes is currently the Principal at Severna Park Elementary School.

#### Dr. Michael Browne, MAESP's 2017 National Distinguished Principal

Dr. Michael Browne has served in the educational field for over 21 years. Prior to becoming the principal at Pocomoke Elementary School, he served there as the assistant principal for eight years. Michael is a firm believer in the importance and the benefits of being a lifelong learner. He earned an Associate's Degree in Music from The Community College of Philadelphia, a Bachelor's of Science in Elementary Education from West Chester University of Pennsylvania, a Master's of Education Degree in School Administration, and a Master's of Education Degree in School Counseling from Wilmington University of Delaware. In addition, he holds a Post Master's Certificate in Applied Technology in Education from Wilmington University. This past June he received his Doctor of Education Degree from Wilmington University with a concentration on School Leadership and Supervision.

Dr. Browne believes in educating the whole child, and has taken steps to ensure that each student in his care is receiving the social and emotional support needed for success. To that end, Pocomoke Elementary School has become a leader in PBIS, SEFEL, and Restorative Practices.

Knowing that a student's success begins at home, Dr. Browne has also spearheaded several initiatives within his school to boost parental involvement. Pocomoke Elementary now boasts a Parent Support Library for at-home instruction complete with videos created by teachers, and has launched three successful digital adventures for parents and students to take virtual field trips together.

As an instructional leader, Dr. Browne served as a member of the Maryland's PARCC Leadership Cadre and has immersed himself in understanding the Common Core Standards and their implications for instruction. He created a "unity in purpose" among his faculty and has worked hard to help his staff understand and implement the instructional shifts that are prescribed by Maryland College and Career Readiness Standards. The results of his efforts have been impressive. In the three years of PARCC testing, Pocomoke Elementary has scored higher than the state average in both English Language Arts and Mathematics and has demonstrated consistent growth each year.

Dr. Browne has distinguished himself by consistently seeking to grow his teachers and educational assistants through professional development opportunities and by providing students with engaging learning environments. These efforts are evident through Pocomoke Elementary School's implementation of FAME, the Maryland Collaborative Model of Peer Coaching, and the launching of an art-immersion initiative through the Wahl Foundation Grant, to create a Global Learning Lab with 3D technology.

These innovations have resulted in Pocomoke Elementary School being named as a Maryland's Superlative Highest Performing Rewards School, a Title I Highest Performing Rewards School, and selected as a National Title I Distinguished School.

#### Lorie Barnes, MAESP's 2017 Assistant Principal of the Year

Lorie Barnes, newly appointed Principal at Severna Park Elementary School in Anne Arundel County, was named The Outstanding Assistant Principal of the Year this past spring. At the time, Lorie was Assistant Principal, Dean of Academics at Monarch Global Academy, a public charter school in Anne Arundel County.

Three years ago, Lorie embarked on the journey of helping to open Monarch Global Academy and, in doing so, played a pivotal role in developing the structures and culture at the new school. Lorie believes that to create "positive change and maintain high expectations, there needs to be shared leadership and deliberate effort to understand, have empathy, and to act on behalf of others."

This belief was put to practice at Monarch Global Academy as Lorie led the hiring, academic coaching, and leadership teams. During the three years of service at Monarch Global Academy, Barnes helped to cultivate an academic culture with teachers that centered on a consistent desire to engage and teach all students. Her goal was to build the capacity of those around her through professional development and opportunities to lead others.

Barnes was previously a teacher at Jessup Elementary and at Monarch Academy in Glen Burnie. She attributes her award and leadership abilities to the mentors she has worked with at these previous locations, especially Donna O'Shea, Principal at Monarch Global Academy.

Barnes graduated from the University of Maryland, College Park, with a Master of Education in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies and holds a Bachelor of Science in elementary education from Towson University.

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

Each year the Maryland Association of Secondary School Principals (MASSP) in collaboration with the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP) selects a Principal of the Year who represents Maryland in Washington D.C. at the national awards ceremonies.

MASSP's 2018 Middle School Principal of the Year is Mr. George Lindley, principal at Arundel Middle School in Anne Arundel County. He has led Arundel Middle for two years after serving as principal at Lindale Middle for 10 years. Mr. Lindley has led his staff to create professional learning communities that focused on student engagement and on clearly articulated expectations for student behavior. Creating a climate of shared responsibility and empowerment was his first priority for AMS, and he did so by setting up structures that provide avenues through which staff, faculty, students, and parents have a voice in school processes and procedures.

MASSP's 2018 High School Principal of the Year is Ms. Sandra Reid, principal at Pikesville High School in Baltimore County. Under her leadership, Pikesville now only offers "honors" classes so that students from all socio-economic backgrounds are able to interface with, and learn from, each other. This allows teachers to stretch their teaching acumen and meet the needs of ALL our students in an engaging, learner-centered environment. Daily, students are taught lifelong, fundamental skills of effective writing, critical thinking, reading of complex text, organizational methodologies, and collaboration in a blended learning setting. # George Lindley from Arundel Middle School 2018 Middle School Principal of the Year



# **George Lindley**

Arundel Middle School Principal George Lindley has long been known as an educator who quickly deflects credit to others for the successes at schools which he leads. Lindley is in his second year as principal of Arundel Middle School after serving for ten years as principal at Lindale Middle School - both in Anne Arundel County. Although the two schools are very different, Lindley's leadership has had a strong influence on the two communities where he has served as principal.

When Lindley arrived at Arundel Middle School, school leadership was struggling with low morale among staff and students and a history of disparate levels of performance among student groups. Working with the leadership team, Mr. Lindley quickly established professional learning communities that focused on student engagement and on clearly articulated expectations for student behavior. Creating a climate of shared responsibility and empowerment was his first priority for AMS, and he did so by setting up structures that provide avenues through which staff, faculty, students, and parents have a voice in school processes and procedures. By the end of Mr. Lindley's first year at AMS, math performance rose 15% over the year before. The focus on instructional practices to engage students has helped the AA referral rate to drop from 49% in SY '14/'15 to 44% today – and that continues to drop.

That same philosophy was evident in Mr. Lindley's leadership at Lindale Middle School, where he established the STEM program, an ESOL cluster, and outstanding PBIS and AVID programs. Throughout his career as a school leader, Mr. Lindley has modeled his belief that relationship-building is critical, especially with middle school students. He is a presence in the halls, in the classrooms, and in the cafeteria, as well as at extra-curricular events. He values the relationships and perspectives of all of the stakeholders in the building – students, staff, parents, community members, and organizations. The inclusive nature of his leadership has gone far in contributing to the change in the culture and climate of both Lindale Middle and Arundel Middle Schools.

Since arriving in AACPS in 1992, Lindley has served as a social studies teacher at Chesapeake Bay Middle School, administrative intern and assistant principal at Southern High School, assistant principal at Marley Middle School, and principal at Lindale and Arundel middle schools. Said Superintendent George Arlotto: "George Lindley epitomizes the caring, compassionate, committed, and calm demeanor that every outstanding educator possesses. Most importantly, every task he undertakes is done with the best interests of every one of his students in mind. He is incredibly deserving of this award, and we are very proud that he is on the AACPS team."
