MINUTES OF THE MARYLAND STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Monday, August 24, 2020 Maryland State Board of Education 200 W. Baltimore Street Baltimore, Maryland 21201

The Maryland State Board of Education met via WebEx videoconference on Monday August 24, 2020 at 9:00 a.m. The following members participated on the videoconference call: Mr. Clarence Crawford (President); Ms. Jean Halle (Vice President); Mr. Shawn Bartley; Ms. Gail Bates; Mr. Charles R. Dashiell, Jr., Esq.; Dr. Susan Getty; Dr. Vermelle D. Greene; Dr. Rose M. Li; Dr. Joan Mele-McCarthy; Ms. Rachel McCusker, Ms. Lori Morrow; Brigadier General (BG) Warner Sumpter (Ret.); Dr. Holly Wilcox; and State Superintendent Dr. Karen B. Salmon. Mr. Jason Wu, Student Representative was not present.

The following staff members also participated: Elliott L. Schoen, Assistant Attorney General; Dr. Sylvia Lawson, Deputy State Superintendent, Office of School Effectiveness; Amalie Brandenburg, Deputy State Superintendent, Office of Finance and Administration; Dr. Carol Williamson, Deputy State Superintendent, Office of Teaching and Learning; and Dr. Miya T. Simpson, Executive Director, Office of the State Board.

President Crawford called the meeting to order and asked Dr. Simpson to conduct the roll call. Mr. Schoen declared the presence of a quorum.

President Crawford explained the virtual meeting procedures.

REPORTS TO THE STATE BOARD FOR DISCUSSION AND/OR ACTION

Dr. Salmon commended Dr. Carol Williamson, Dr. Sylvia Lawson, and Ms. Mary Gable on the work they have done related to the *Maryland Together: Maryland's Recovery Plan for Education*. Dr. Salmon introduced Dr. Williamson, who provided opening remarks and an overview of the recovery plan. Dr. Williamson introduced Ms. Gable, who provided updates and shared plans for the *Local School System Recovery Plans Implementation and Evaluation*. The presentation included information on the first day of school for each local school system, instructional plans/models for the opening of schools, student engagement in the learning process, social emotional learning, grading, attendance, and connectivity.

Dr. Salmon recommended to the State Board that schools be required to provide at least 3.5 hours of synchronous instruction per day.

State Board members inquired and shared concerns about how the department arrived at the 3.5 hour requirement; how the hours will be calculated (per day or total hours per week); synchronous vs. asynchronous instruction requirements and schedules and what counts toward each; ensuring consistency in reporting; and being mindful of equity issues that may arise due to variations across districts. State Board members also stressed the need to be clear about what's included in the timeframe and what activities count toward fulfilling the minimum requirement, and noted the need to give consideration to FERPA concerns around recording lessons and related privacy issues.

President Crawford and Vice President Halle suggested deferring action until Dr. Salmon can get more input from local superintendents and more concrete guidelines are established. Dr. Salmon will do additional research and gather input from local superintendents and bring updates to the State Board at the August 25th meeting.

Dr. Williamson introduced Ms. Tiara Booker-Dwyer to provide an update on the process for the *Local School System Recovery Plans Implementation and Evaluation*. Ms. Booker-Dwyer reported on the implementation and evaluation/ratings process and reviewed ratings guidelines. Ms. Gable reviewed Part One, which looks at the plan, along with the timeline. Part Two was reviewed by Dr. Dara Shaw. Dr. Shaw explained that Part Two is the evaluation component and looks at the plan after the start of the school year and will study the implementation measures and recovery plan outcomes. Dr. Shaw shared some of the sample questions with State Board members.

State Board members inquired about gauging the quality of the teaching materials, student engagement and learning delivery, and districts' instructional design for remote learning. Disaggregated data was also requested. Dr. Salmon will follow up with additional information and quarterly reports will be provided to the State Board.
