Meeting Minutes

April 11, 2024

Communication Update

-Ms. Kitchen wanted to advise the board that the communication update segment of this meeting is for the board members to give updates on things happening in their jurisdictions and to relay information back from their stakeholders.

-Ms. Kitchen asked Ms. Meadows to explain to the board the charge and responsibilities of the board.

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-Ms. Meadows stated that the board focus is educator preparation and licensure. Making sure that educators that are prepared for the classrooms are licensed appropriately based on research and best practices. This is done through the law and regulation.

-Dr. Bulson asked what the distinction between the traditional roll and the role outlined in The Blueprint was. -Ms. Meadows explained The Blueprint outlines that the Professional Standards & Teacher Education Board will participate in consultation, along with the State Board adopting the language having to do with many sections of the blueprint where it's not educator preparation. She stated that s regulations are drafted for other parts of the blueprint this board will be apart of consulting with State Board on the regulations.

Communication Update Cont'd

Ms. Spain asked School Social Workers meeting special education requirements. She stated in the old regulations a Social Worker received a Standard Professional Certificate (SPC) and was given 5 years to meet the special education requirements. The new regulations now state that a School Social Worker is not given a license until that meet that requirement. Ms. Spain feels that this will be a huge detriment in getting School Social Workers. She was asking for clarifications.

-Ms. Meadows wanted to clarify that this requirement is not just for Social Workers but for every Specialist, Supervisor, and Administrator area. Ms. Meadows stated in the regulations that were previously in place, the requirement was that each one of those licensure areas have three semester hours of special education course

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work to earn licensure. That was in place for decades because at that time it was difficult to hire. She stated those individuals do not typically have 3 credit courses of special education when they come into the education field. The decision was made to issue a policy memorandum for those Specialists and Administrators to get the professional credential and at their first renewal cycle; they are required to provide that course work. She expressed that policy cannot trump regulation. She stated we went against regulation and allowed initial requirements to be presented at renewal. During this round of repeal and replacement we have stripped that requirement for the Specialist and Administrators because in the renewal requirements we have some of the content to incorporate working with students with special needs. During the October 2022 meeting the Professional Standards and Teacher Education Board asked MSDE to put that requirement back in. Ms. Meadows that that there will be issues and barriers. She stated that MSDE is working internally to create an asynchronous course that will suffice for this requirement. As well as our Continuing Professional Development Credits that are getting ready to be published. She stated the MSDE has taken steps knowing this would be a barrier.

Discussion Items

Military Reciprocity

Ms. Meadows explained The Service Members Civil Relief Act (SCRA), codified at 50 U.S.C. §§ 3901—4043, provides service members and their families with a wide variety of financial and housing protections. On January 5, 2023, President Joseph Biden signed the Veterans Auto and Education Improvement Act of 2022 (H.R. 7939) into law. Section 19 of this law amends the SCRA by adding provisions for portability of professional licenses of service members and their spouses.

This new SCRA provision, codified at 50 U.S.C. § 4025a, allows service members and their spouses to use their professional licenses and certificates in certain circumstances when they must relocate due to military orders. For a license to be considered valid in a new location, a service member or their spouse must satisfy the following five criteria:

1. Have moved to a location outside the jurisdiction of the licensing authority that issued the covered license or certificate because of orders for military service;

- 2. Provide a copy of the military orders to the licensing authority in the new jurisdiction;
- 3. Have actively used the license or certificate during the two years immediately preceding the move;
- 4. Remain in good standing with:
 - a. the licensing authority that issued the covered license or certificate; and
- b. every other licensing authority that issued a valid license or certificate for a similar scope of practice and in the discipline applied for in the new jurisdiction; and
- 5. Submit to the licensing authority in the new jurisdiction for the purposes of standards of practice, discipline, and fulfillment of any continuing education requirements.
- 6. If these five criteria are met, the service member or their spouse's covered license or certificate "shall be considered valid at a similar scope of practice and in the discipline applied for in the [new] jurisdiction" for the duration of military orders, in addition to the expedited credentialing for service members and their spouses.
- 7. Some states are members of interstate licensure compacts, which allow licensed practitioners to

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work in other compact-member states without needing a new license or certificate. The new SCRA

provision requires that service members or their spouses who are relocating between two states that are governed by the same interstate licensure compact are subject to the requirements of that interstate compact, rather than the new SCRA provision. If, however, a service member or their spouse with a license or certificate issued by a state involved in an interstate licensure compact is relocating to a state not involved in the same interstate compact, the new SCRA provision applies. Additionally, if a service member or their spouse has a license not covered by any interstate licensure compact, the new SCRA provision applies.

Response from MSDE

This federal law provides professional licensure and certification reciprocity for service members and their spouses applies to Maryland. Accordingly, MSDE will immediately update its policies and procedures for processing applications for these service members and their spouses. MSDE will also update its statutes and regulations for alignment with this federal law.

MSDE is currently working with its technology vendor to allow service members and their spouses to apply for reciprocal educator certification in Maryland and submit requisite documentation of eligibility directly through. The Educator Application and Certification Hub (TEACH). Once these changes have been made in TEACH, MSDE will provide training to its local education agency (LEA) certification partners.

To ensure compliance with 50 U.S.C. § 4025a in the meantime, MSDE and the LEAs will implement a temporary process through which service members and their spouses can apply for reciprocal educator certification in Maryland. To apply, applicants will submit the following documentation with their TEACH application: 1. Verification of Experience and Certificate Status for Military Service Members and Spouses form;

- 2. Out of State License or Certificate(s);
- 3. Attestation of Certificate Status for Military Service Members and Spouses form;
- 4. Military Orders; and

5. Marriage License (if applicable).

Blueprint Priorities

Ms. Meadows walked the board through the priorities of the PSTEB Board

Statutory Language

§6-120 - The State Board and PSTEB shall adopt regulations, in consultation with the Accountability and Implementation Board (AIB), implementing the requirements surrounding the teacher training practicums as outlined in this subsection. This governs the duration of the practicum, the content required for alternative teacher prep programs, and defines the role of mentor teachers in the teacher preparation process. [COMPLETED- COMAR 13A.07.06- Programs for Professionally Licensed Personnel]

§6-121 - The State Board and PSTEB shall adopt regulations, in consultation with the AIB, establishing the requirements for teacher preparation programs, to include components of instruction and use of certain assessments. [COMPLETED- COMAR 13A.07.06- Programs for Professionally Licenses Personnel] **§6-1002** - The State Board, in consultation with PSTEB, shall approve a program of study for teacher pursuing the "master's equivalent" option in level two of the career ladder. [COMPLETED- COMAR 13A.12.02.02D(2)(b), Advanced Professional License]

§6-1006 - The State Board, in consultation with PSTEB, shall establish the criteria that a teacher shall meet to achieve the licensed principal tier of the career ladder and establish a process through which an individual may receive a waiver to serve as a licensed principal if they are not a Nationally Board-certified teacher, but

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meet other qualification determined by the SBOE (in consultation with PSTEB). [IN PROGRESS- workgroup planned for May 2024]

§6-1013 - The State Board, in consultation with PSTEB and the AIB, shall adopt regulations to carry out this subtitle. This encompasses the establishment of the career ladder as specified in 6-1002, and the criteria that accompanies each level therein. [ONGOING]

Overview of Subtitle

The various provisions include the breakdown of teacher time depending on their status within the career ladder, the criteria necessary to maintain position and advance on the career ladder, and the coordination within MSDE and at the local school system level to assist teachers in obtaining National Board certification.

This subtitle also specifies the teacher salary increases that accompany various steps on the career ladder, and the minimum teacher salary required by 2026. MSDE must develop and design a system of professional development that is tied to the career ladder.

Finally, teacher evaluation systems used in connection with the career ladder shall be aligned with National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) core propositions, include a peer assistance and review model, and use observations to make various evidence-based determinations to evaluate teachers.

COMAR Corrections and Clarifications

Ms. Meadows walked the board through all the corrections and clarifications made to COMAR 13A.12.01. She stated that if the board agrees with corrections and changes, they could request permission to publish.
