PURPOSE:

To update the State Board on Attendance for the school year 2020-2021 and Enrollment for school year 2021-2022.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The presentation will include background information and available data on attendance and enrollment. Information presented will include:

2. Attendance rate trends,
3. Mobility and habitual truant data, and
4. Chronic absenteeism.

In addition, Attendance Works will present a national perspective of chronic absenteeism and provide information on essential actions that state and local policy makers can take to ensure that students are engaged in learning.

National Perspective – Attendance Works

Enrollment refers to whether a student's name was, is, or will be officially registered on the roll of a school or schools.

Enrollment: State Law



Admission

Under State Law all individuals aged 5 years old or older and under 21 shall be admitted free of charge to the public schools of this State. (Md. Ann. Code., Ed. Art, §7-101)

Location

Each child shall attend a public school in the county where the child lives with their parent or guardian. (Md. Ann. Code., Ed. Art, §7-101)

Collection Timeline

The MSDE collects enrollment once per year as of September 30 or the closest weekday if the date falls on the weekend. The September 30 date is established in State Law. (Md. Ann. Code, Ed. Art., §5-201(g)(1))

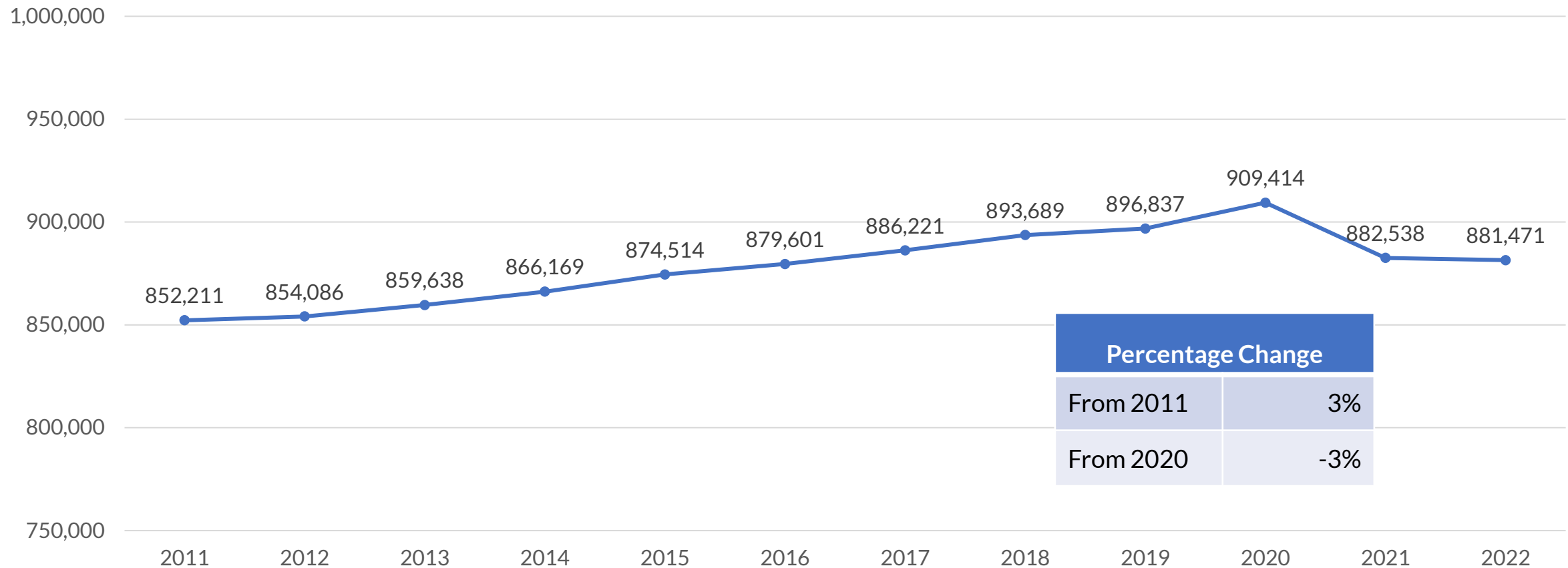
- The nation's public schools in 2020-2021 lost more than 1 million students, partly due to the pandemic and the widespread shuttering of in-person learning.
- During the pandemic every state saw a dip in enrollment.
- Most of the nation's enrollment drop took place in the early grades.

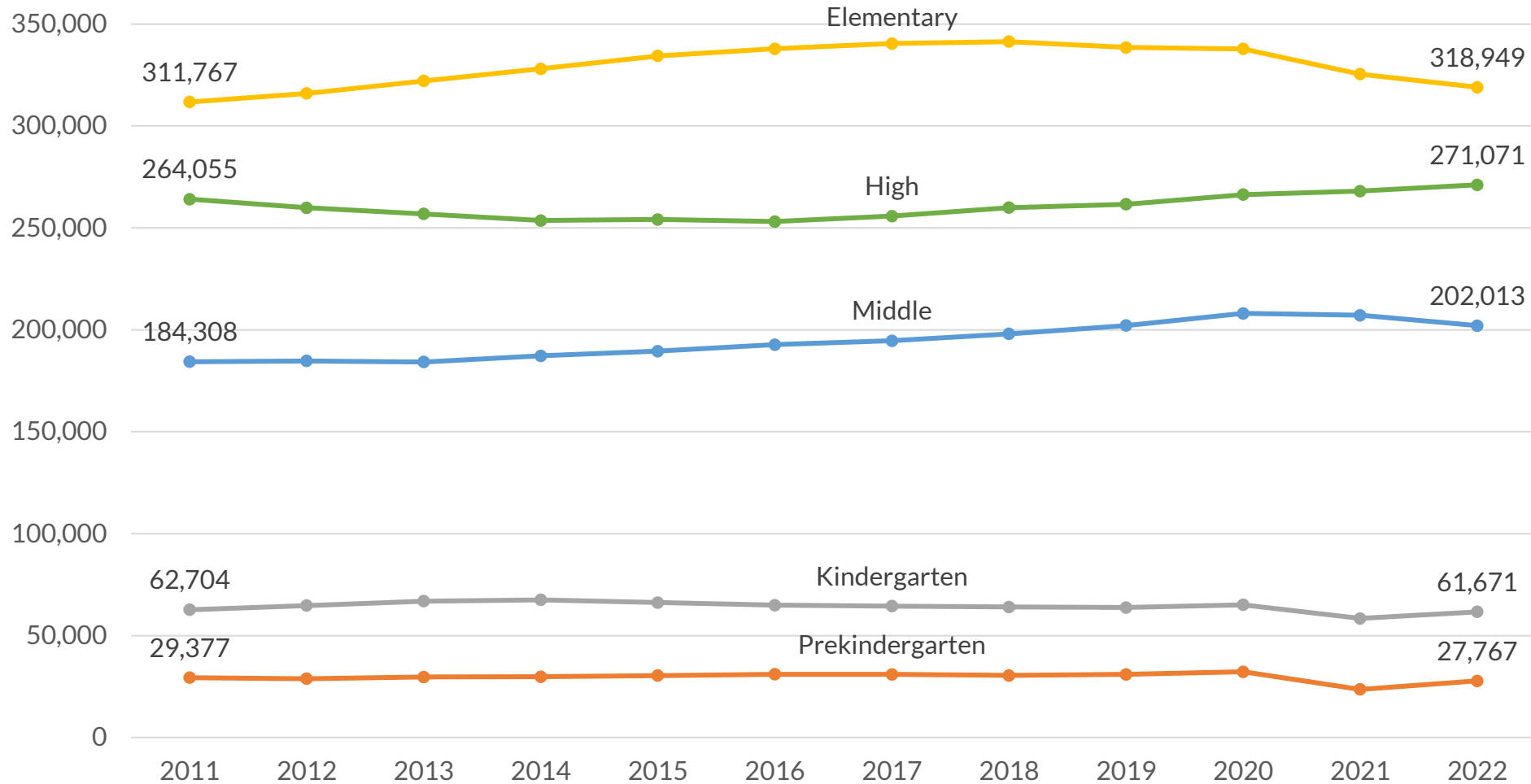
Maryland Public School Enrollment: Trend for All Students

Maryland Public School Enrollment: Trend by Grade Bands

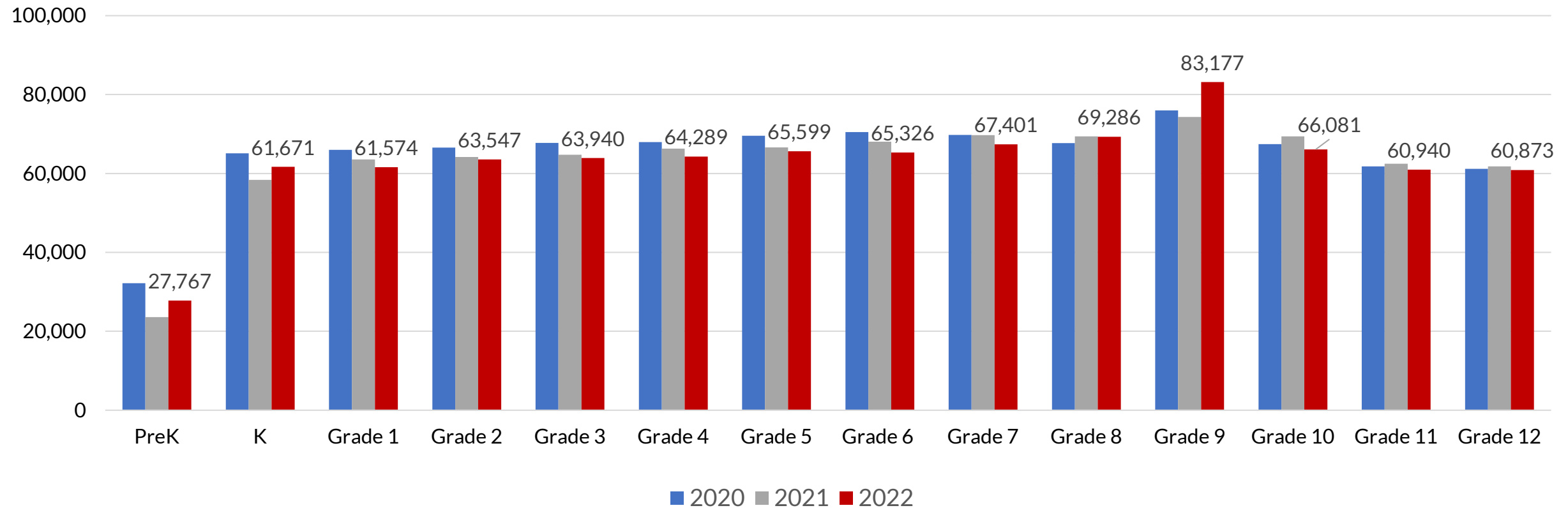

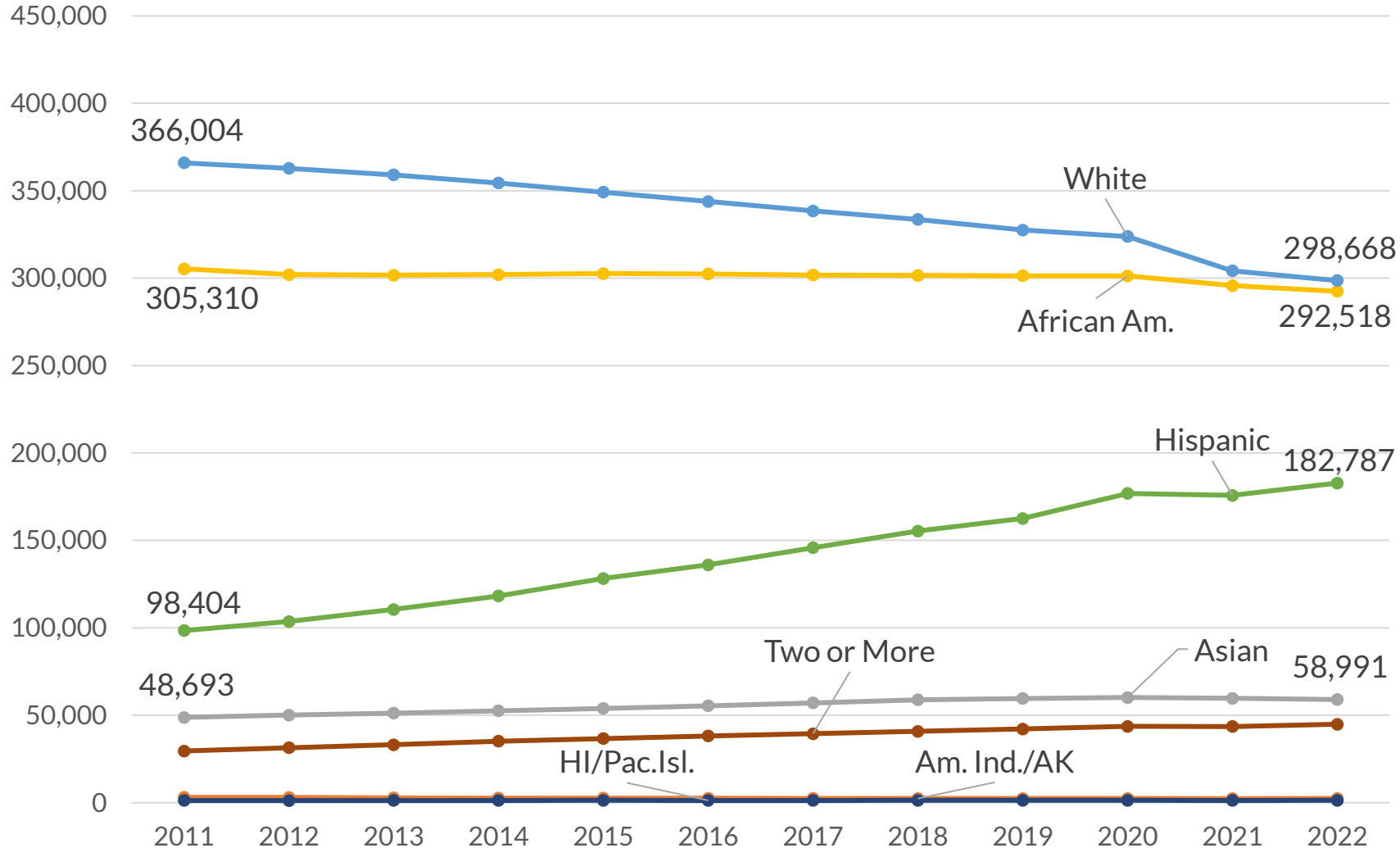
Maryland Public School Enrollment: By Grade



Enrollment has been impacted by the pandemic with decreases across all grades in the 2020-2021 school year as compared to pre-pandemic 2019-2020 school year. Pre-K, Kindergarten and 9th grade increased in enrollment for the 2021-2022 school year as compared to 2020-2021 school year.

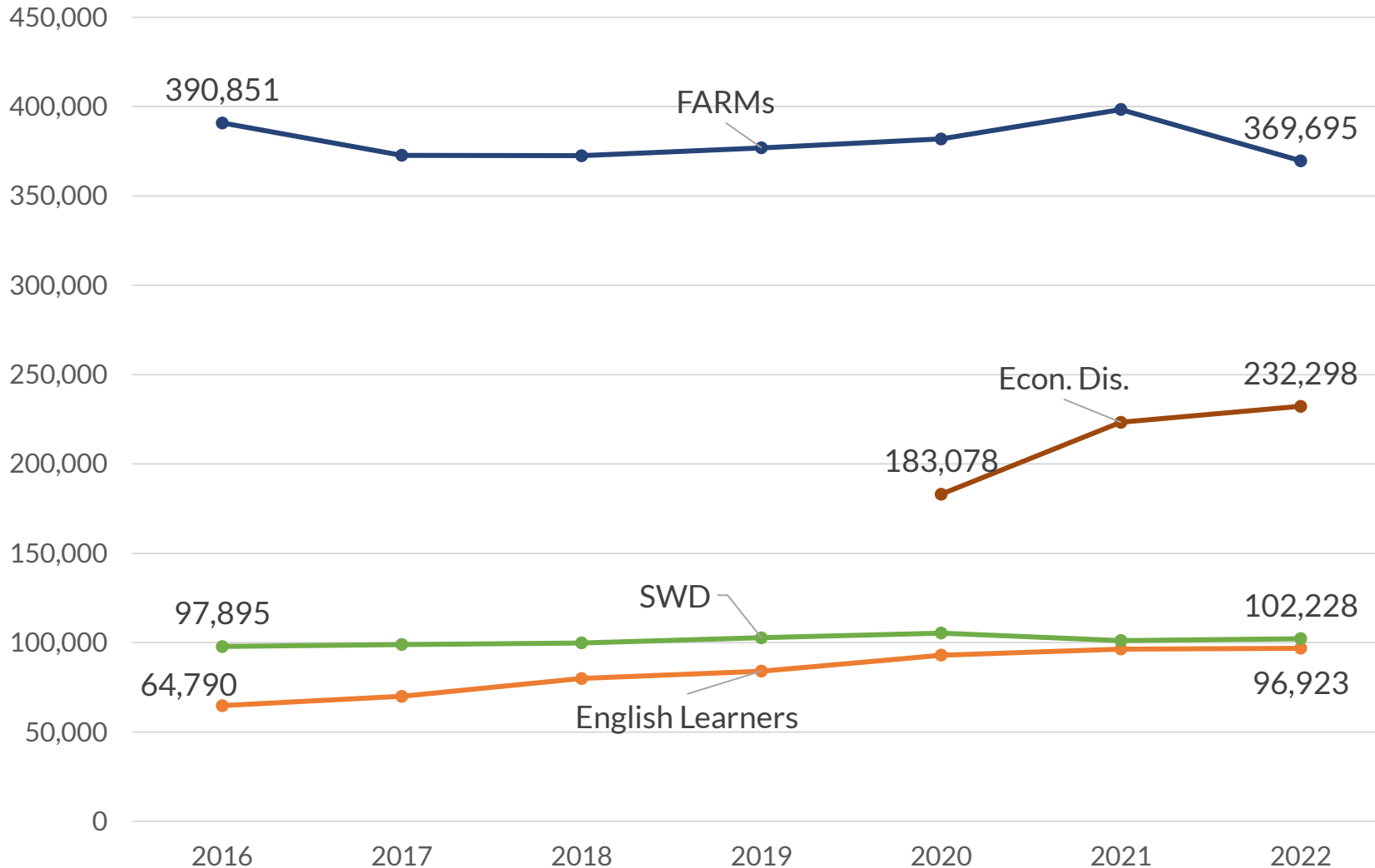


Maryland Public School Enrollment: Trend by Race and Ethnicity



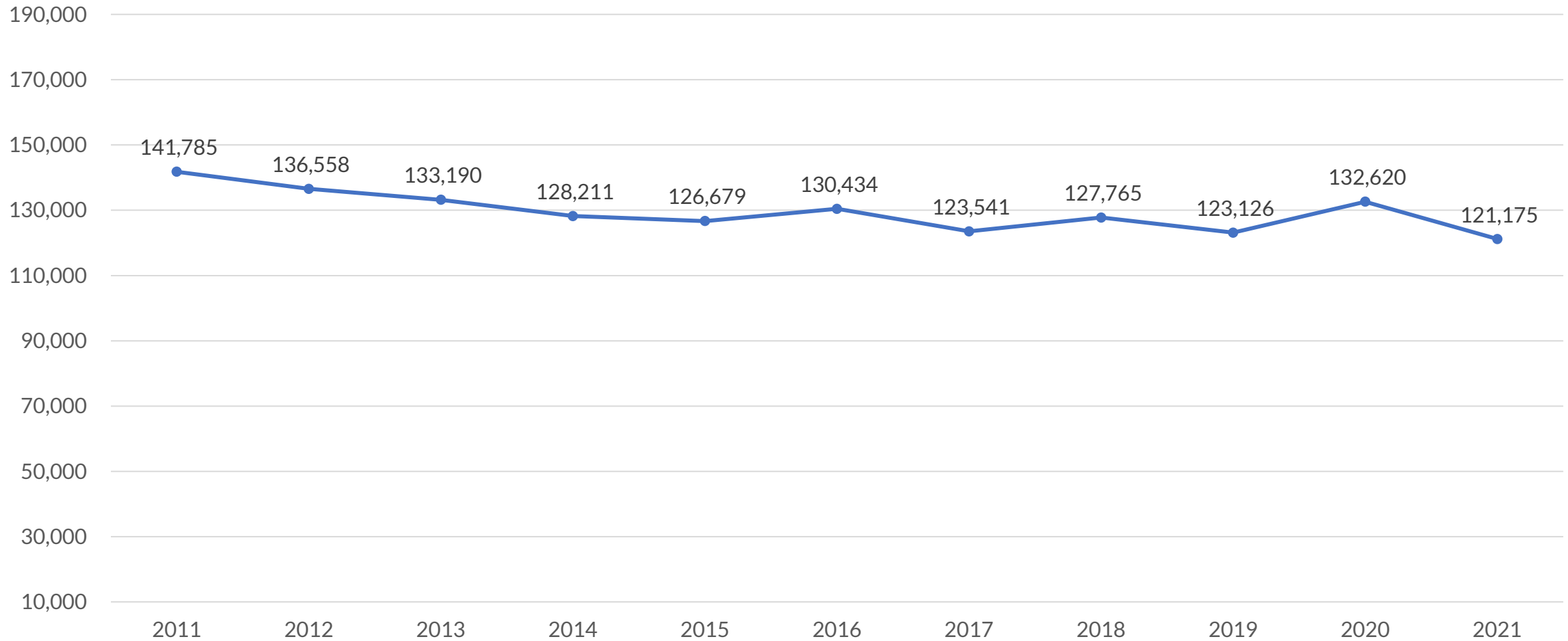

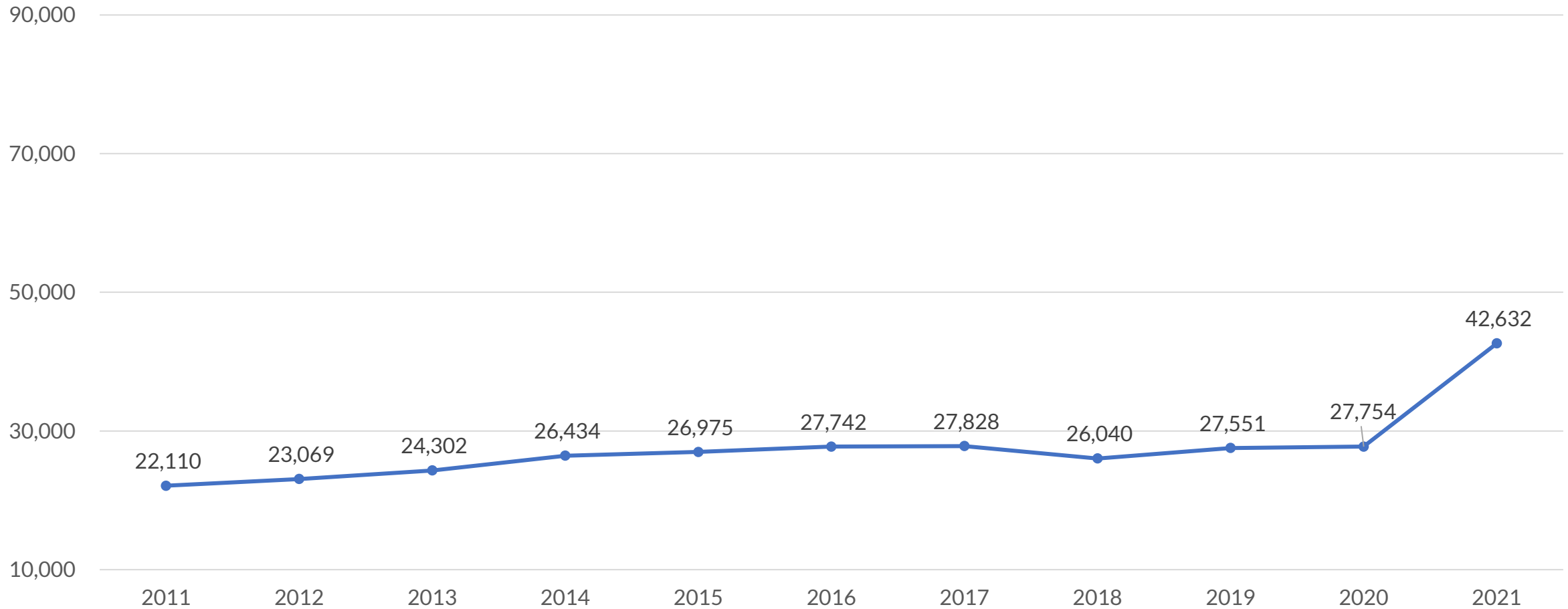

Attendance refers to a student's presence or absence in an instructional program approved by the state, district, and/or school.

Attendance: State Law



Definition

Attendance means that a student is present at school on a regular school day and includes participation in school-sponsored activities. (COMAR 13A.02.06.02B(5); COMAR 13A.08.01.01; 2020 Maryland Student Records System Manual)

Compulsory Attendance

Each child who resides in this State and is 5 years old or older and under 18 shall attend a public school regularly during the entire school year. (Md. Ann. Code, Ed. Art., §7-301(a-1))

Student Attendance Policy

Each local school system shall develop a student attendance policy which includes a record of daily attendance. (COMAR 13A.08.01.05)

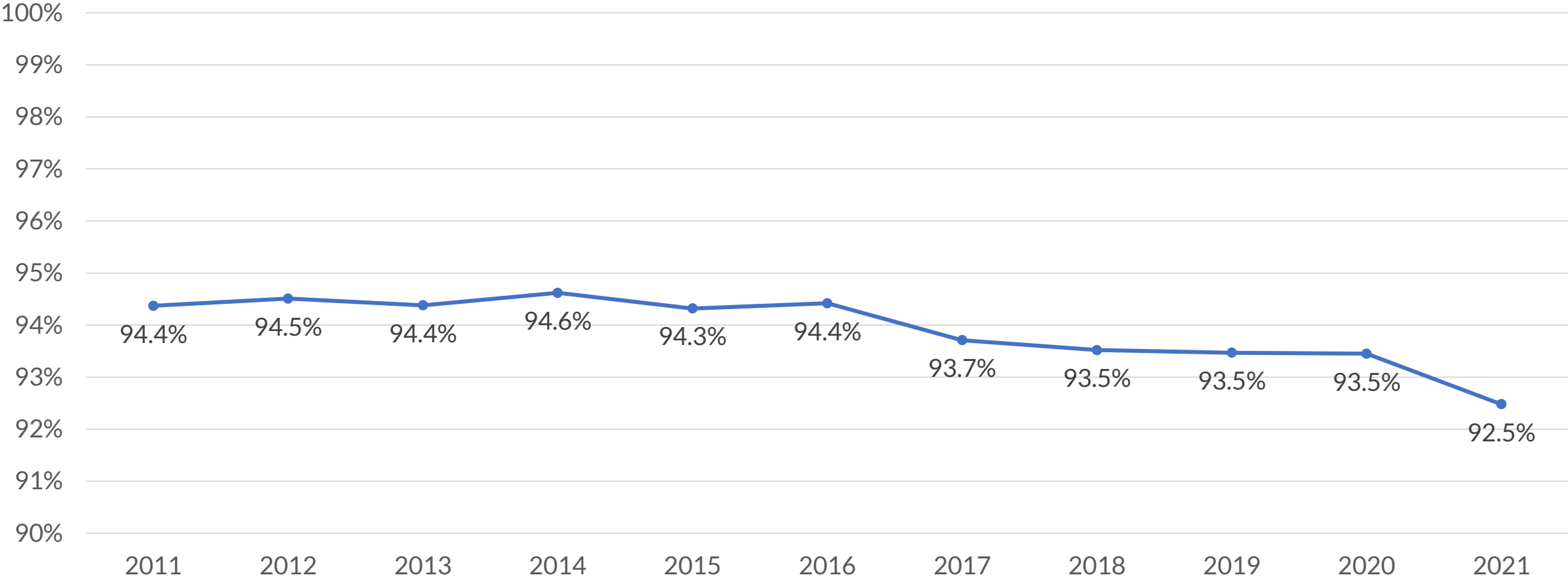
Collection Timeline

The MSDE collects attendance 3 times per year in September, Spring, and the End of the School Year.

Attendance Rate: The percent of students in grades 1-12 who attend school each day.

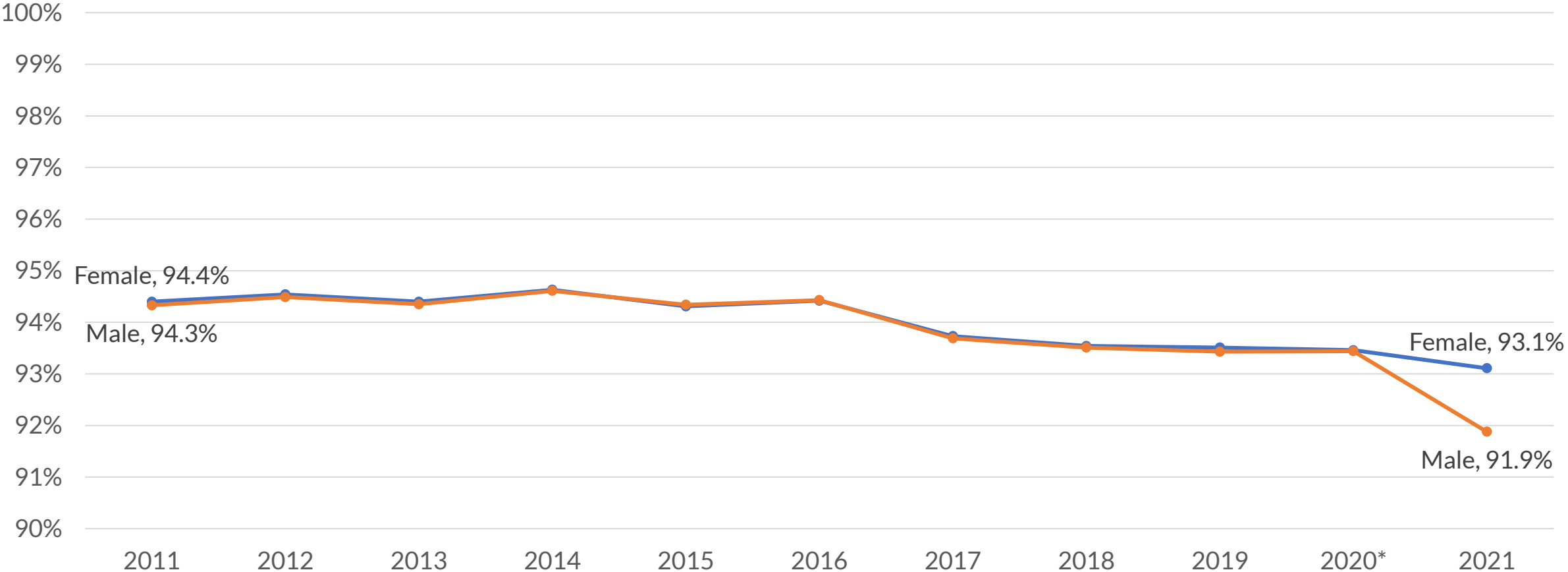

Attendance Rate: The percent of students in grades 1-12 who attend school each day.

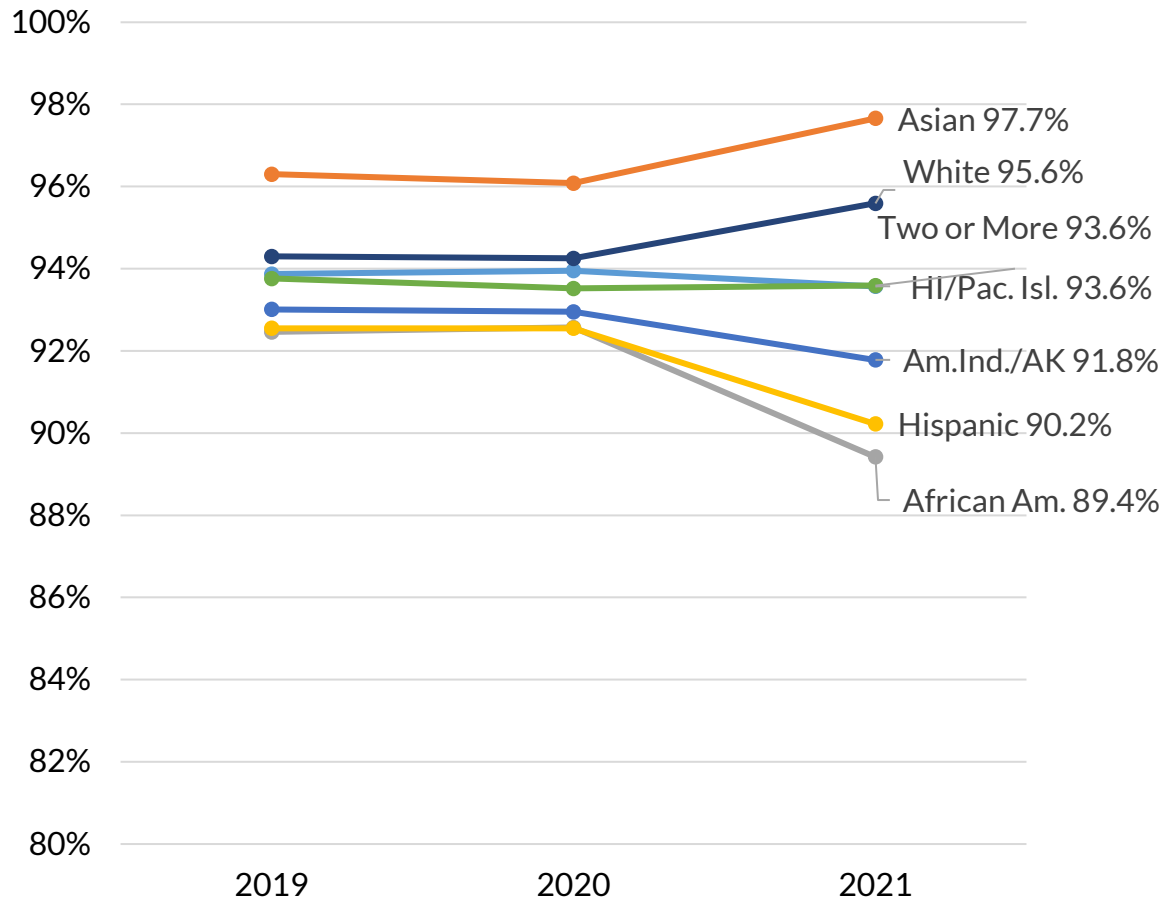


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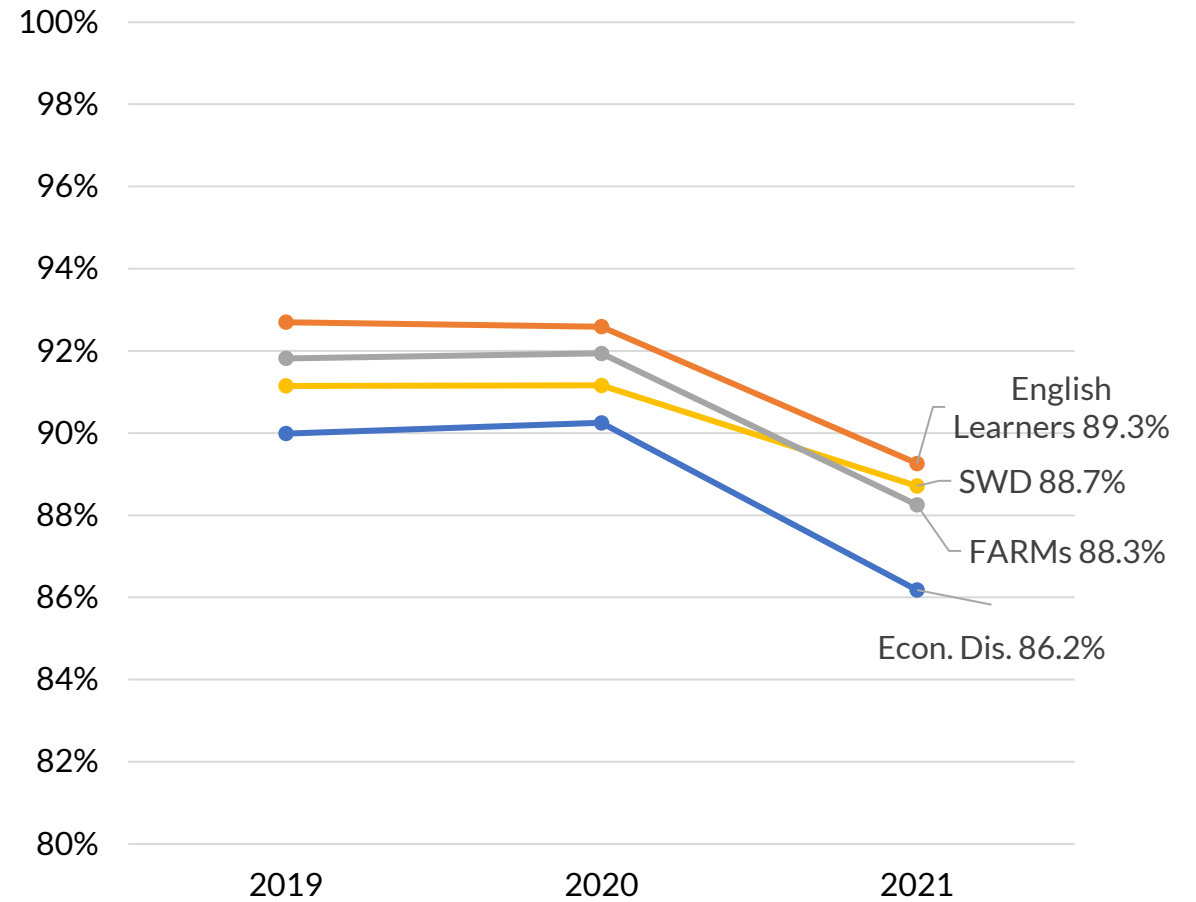

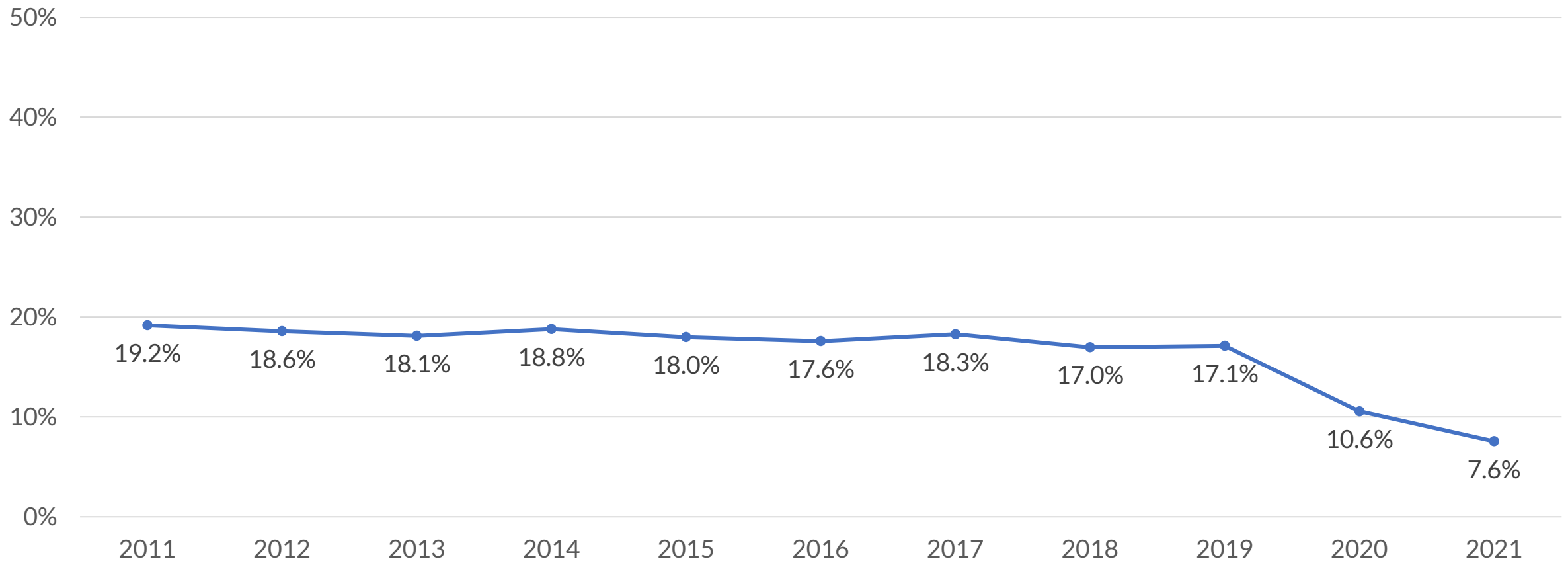

Mobility Rate: Trend by All Students



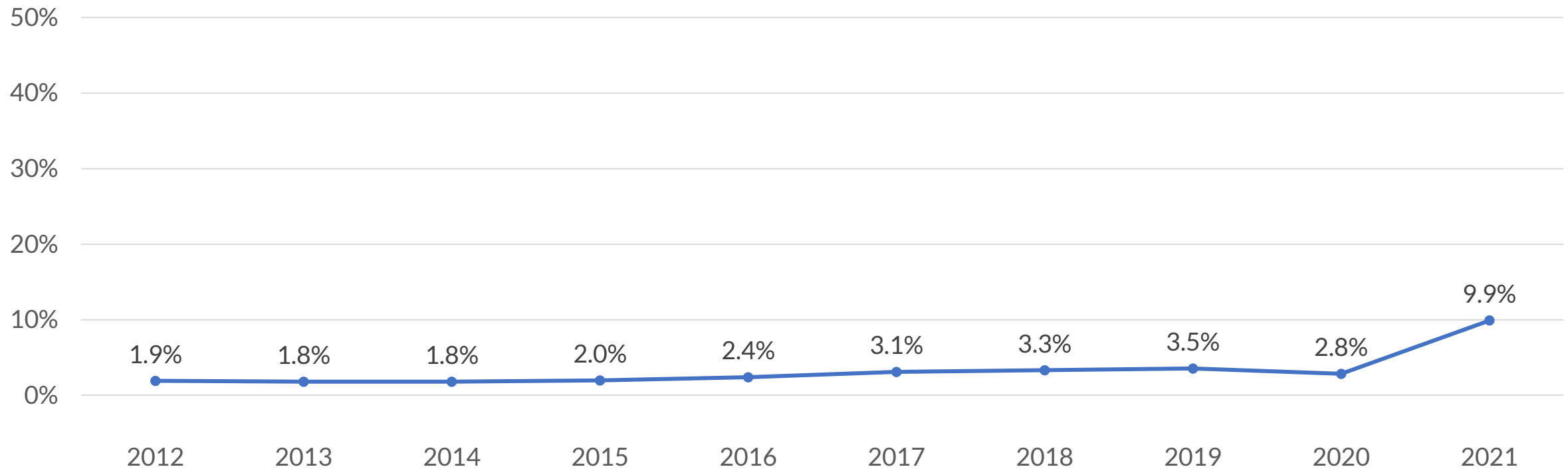
Mobility Rate: The percentage of students that either entered or withdrew from a school during the school year.



Habitual Truants: Trend for All Students



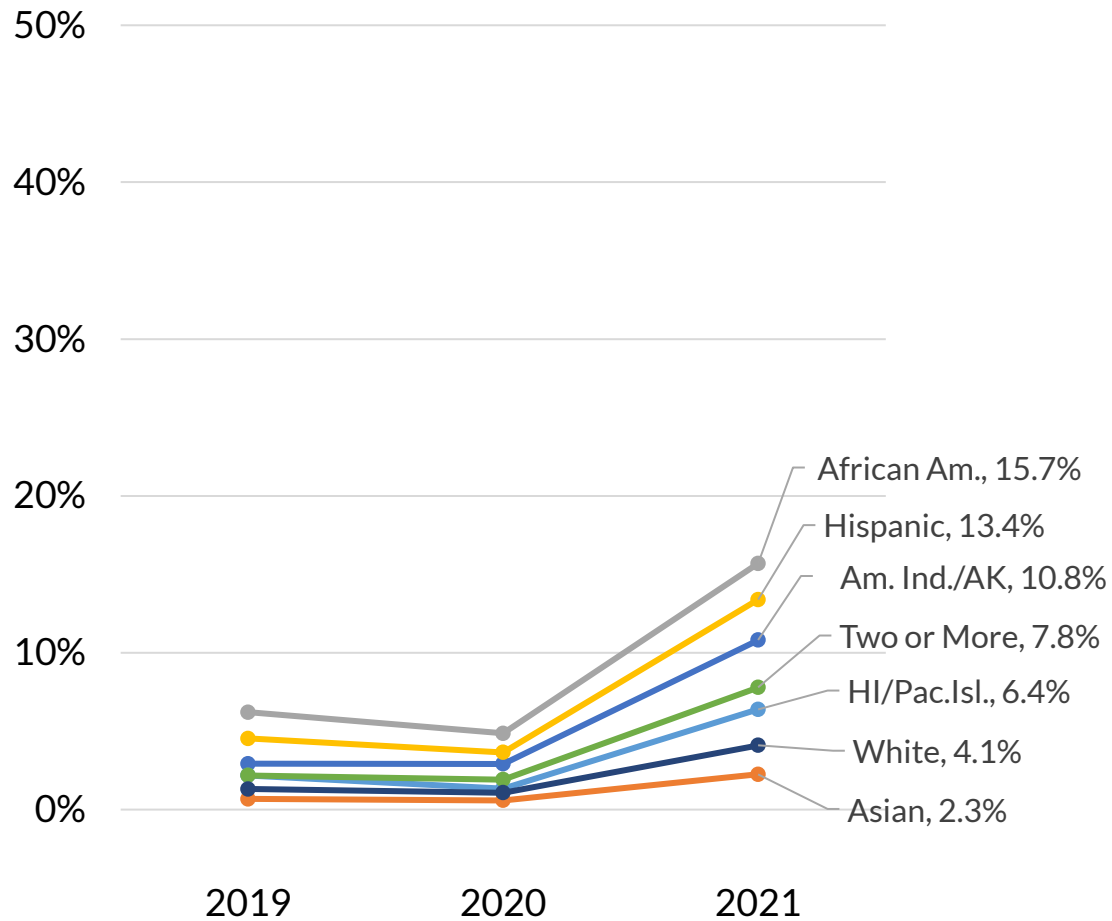
Habitual Truant: Defined in state law as a student who is unlawfully absent from school for more than 8 days in any quarter, 15 days in any semester, or 20 days in a school year. State law requires LEAs to develop a **system of active interventions for truant students** and refer students for those interventions. (Md. Ann. Code, Ed. Art., §7-302.2)



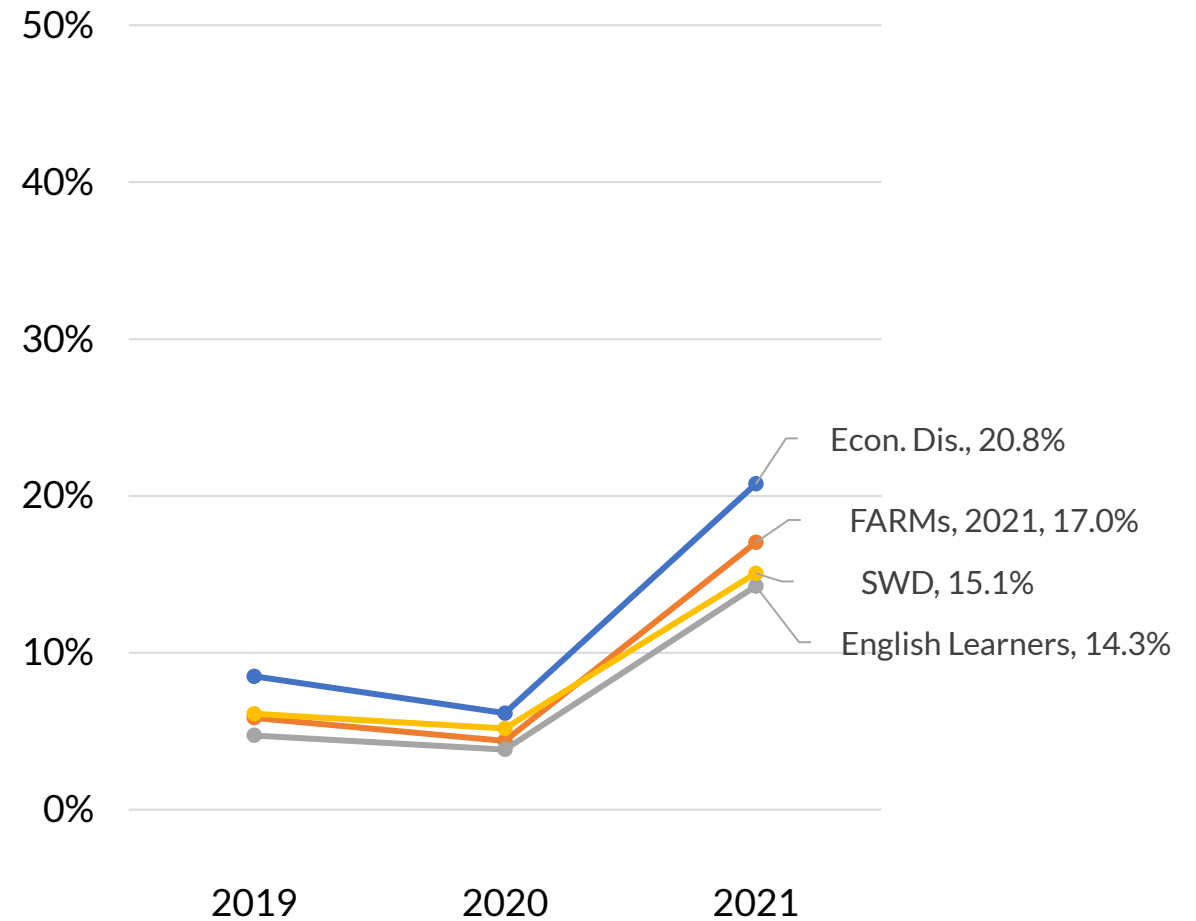
Habitual Truants: by Student Groups

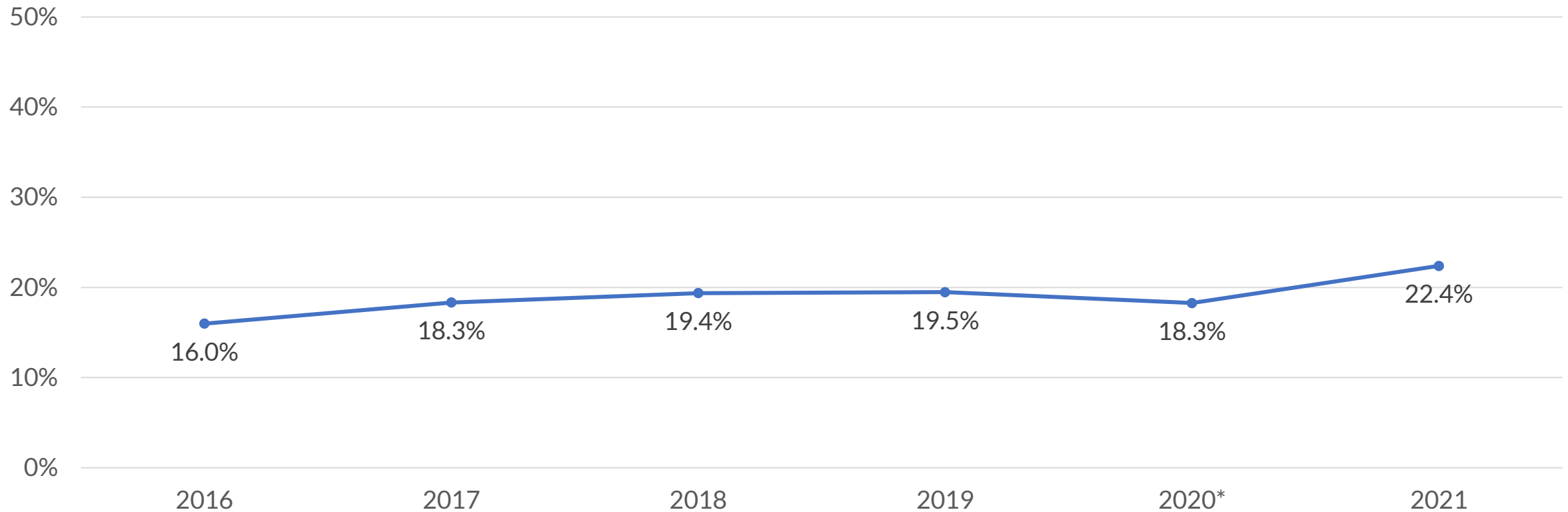

Chronic Absenteeism Rate: Trend by All Students



Chronic Absenteeism: Students are chronically absent when absent 10% or more of the school days while enrolled at that school. For example, a student who is registered to attend a school for 30 days and who is absent 3 of those 30 days is considered chronically absent.



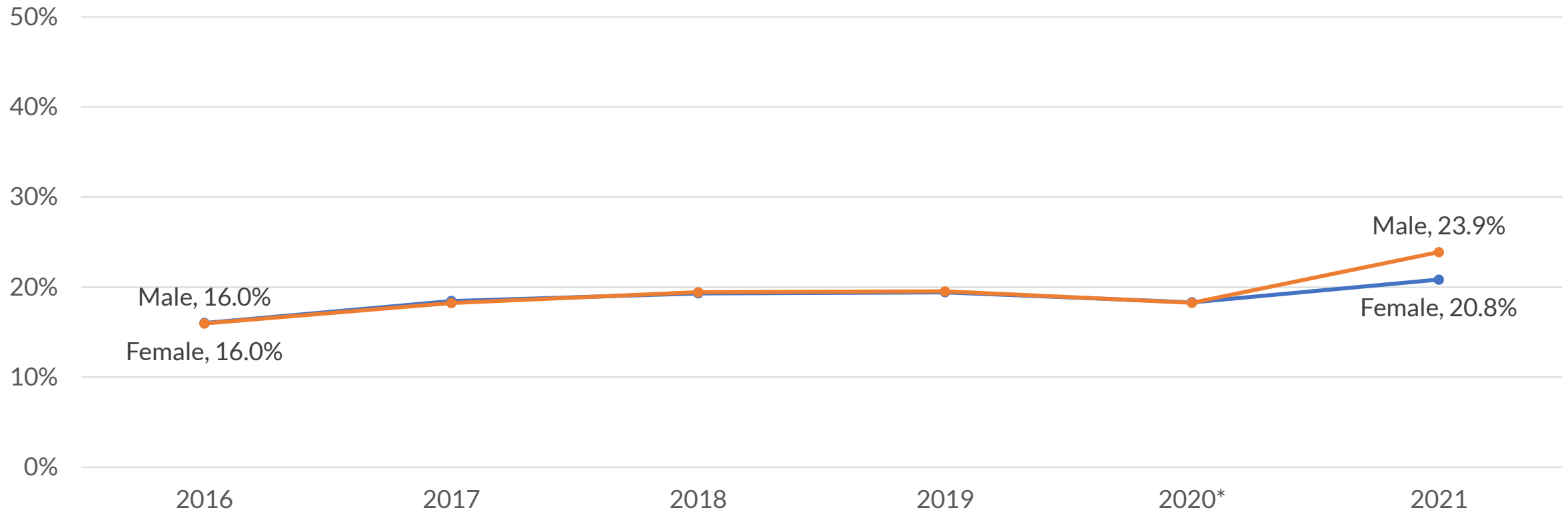

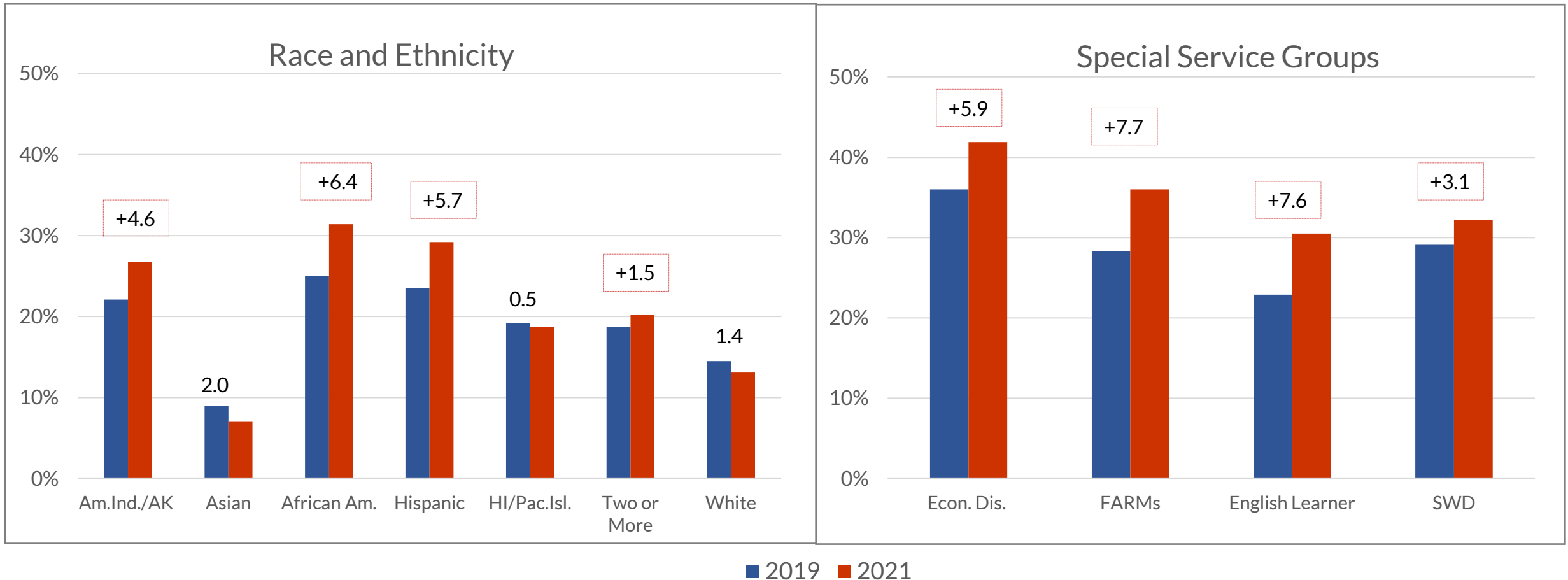

Chronic Absenteeism: by Student Groups



Chronic Absenteeism has been impacted by the pandemic with increases across most student groups in the 2020-2021 school year as compared to pre-pandemic 2018-2019 school year.



- In-person schooling is back this school year, but fewer students than normal are regularly attending class according to emerging data. **More students are missing out on instruction after many fell behind last year** (Barnum, 2021).
- Disruptions to learning are not over, and student attendance rates lag significantly behind pre-pandemic levels.
- Reports of **chronic absenteeism have increased since before the pandemic**. Low-income students are 1.6 times more likely to be missing multiple days of school than their high-income peers.
- Based on historical links between chronic absenteeism and graduation, 1.7 million to 3.3 million eighth-12th grade **students could drop out of school due to the pandemic without coordinated efforts to reengage them in learning** (Dorn et al.; 2021).
